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The Unending Pause

When I was teenager, I was heavily involved in the school media program, which, for my middle school and high school, was cutting edge. We produced daily news shows, programmed a 24/7 cable access channel, and aired football games, graduations, and other special programs that students helped to shoot, edit, and produce. It was what led me to purse a degree in film and video production.

We worked in tape – video and audio. One of the biggest mistakes we tried to avoid was leaving a video or audio unit on pause for too long. There was no more disheartening feeling than walking into an editing suite hours or even a day or so later and finding something left on pause for an unusually extended period. Leaving a player on pause stretches the tape, and significantly decreases the quality. There were times where shots, clips, and shows were lost to the unending pause.

The pandemic has had a similar effect. Many parts of our lives have been on pause for such a long time, that it's left us sometimes feeling stretched and fragile, much like a piece of audio or video tape, only with greater consequences.

When the pandemic started impacting our daily lives eighteen months ago, all of us hoped the "pause" would be brief. But it hasn't been. Even with vaccines and other measures, it has taken far longer to end than anyone could have foreseen. We are still in it. But we can't stay on pause.

This week, I shared with several people and the session that one of the most exciting moments in worship last Sunday was the fact that announcements took longer than they have since before the pandemic. It means we are doing more. We are reclaiming space to do ministry and rediscover what it means to be a congregation looking to a post-pandemic age.

We must continue with precautions and stay flexible as we move forward, but in my view, we are overdue for getting things off pause. For the immediate future, we have to look for how we answer Christ's call amid the pandemic, but also with an eye to a preferable future. But we can't do that if we are stuck on pause. We can't keep waiting. Our mission as Christ's people continues no matter what hardships we are facing in our lives. Because what we will find is that throughout the pause, Christ has been faithful.

It is time to respond in faith and faithfulness to the One who has carried us this far.

Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries

Hello, all! I am Garth Stevens-Jennings, the new Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries. I have been asked to introduce myself and give some of my thoughts as to why youth and children's ministries are an important part of the life of the Church.

So first, a bit about me. I am a (relatively) recent seminary graduate; I attended Wesley Theological Seminary and graduated with a Master's in Divinity and a Master's in Theology. Initially my plan was to pursue ordination as a priest in the Episcopal Church, but the more I learned in my studies the more frustrated I became, so many of the ideas and concepts that I was being exposed to I could have learned earlier in life without having to spend so much money at a graduate program! As time went on I became aware of a change in my sense of calling, my new vocational goal was to take the insights I had gleaned from my time at seminary into the church at large, particularly to the youth and children of the Church who we often wrongly dismiss as being unable to handle some of the more difficult aspects of Christian theology.

Speaking of children and youth, let's talk a bit about why ministry to these parts of the Church is so important. We as humans and as Christians exist (hopefully) in a perpetual state of development and growth. As we go through life and as we live our faith we change and evolve in our perception and understanding of who we are and who God is, and this is as it should be. Our children and youth are no different, except that the rate of change and growth for them is much, much faster. A child or young adult's life is almost entirely defined by constant and rapid change, and their faith is no exception. This is why it is so vital that we adults of the church, who have the luxury of a more stable sense of self, do all that we can to support and aid in the healthy development of our younger members. I find it helps to think of a grape vine: These plants grow constantly, seeking a place in the sun so that they may bear fruit. Grapegrowers build trellises around their plants, structures intended partially to guide but primarily to support the vines as they grow towards the sun. This is our calling to our youth and children, to be the trellis supporting their growth as they learn who they are and who God is, so that they may grow even beyond us and bear the fruit of the Kingdom. It is every parent's dream to be surpassed by their children, and so we should work towards the goal that the next generation of the church will reach higher than we have and more fully bear witness to the love of Christ amidst a world that desperately needs the good news of the Gospel. Together, we can equip the young among us to do wonderful things, and if we are lucky, they will in turn teach us how to be better Christians.



Ideas and suggestions are small toys, school supplies, hygiene items, t-shirts, socks, ball caps-- that encourage schoolwork and other small items that a boy or girl might like; just make sure it will fit into the box. Located by the mission bulletin board is detailed information, suggestions and instructions on how to pack a box. You can pick up a red/green boxes underneath the Mission Bulletin Board or you may wish to purchase and wrap your own boxes. Just be sure the box top can come off easily to check the contents. The **deadline** for boxes is **Sunday**, **November 21st**, and will then be taken to the shipping point. **Please Note due to customs regulations DO NOT INCLUDE:** candy (of any kind); toothpaste; used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives, or military figures; seeds; chocolate or food; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snow globes or glass containers; aerosol cans.
